

#### INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the Early Years District Profile is to bring together a wide range of indicators for each district. It provides the commissioners with a robust evidence base across a range of health and wellbeing issues to help identify priority areas to target and place services in appropriate areas.

The report pulls together information from various sources to present a picture of the health and wellbeing of children aged 0-4, following through the Best Start Pathway.


The data is presented and displayed at Ward Level with comparisons made with Staffordshire and England. Information used in the report is the latest available at the time of writing.

Health and social needs are complex and it is unlikely that there will be a single factor which is responsible for the particular situation in each local area. Therefore, it is important that no single item of information is treated in isolation. Instead the various pieces of data and evidence should be used together to give a better picture of the needs of children and young people in the local community.

We aim to produce this annually with the next one being due November 2016 to support the Districts with their Local Authority annual conversations.



- Within Tamworth, al wards, with the exception of Bolehall, have a higher number of children subject of a Child Protection Plan than the Staffordshire average, with Glascote having a figure more than three times the Staffordshire average.
- The rate of children being Looked After is slightly more sportive with only two wards, Mercian and Wilnecote having a higher rate than both Staffordshire and England.
- The rate of children in Need across the Tamworth district varies from 46.9 in Trinity to 128.2 in Glascote, giving an overall rate for Tamworth of 85.9, which is over 27 children per 1,000 more than both Stafford-shire and England.
- Nearly 14% of Staffordshire's BRFC families reside in Tamworth of which 47.5% of the children are under the age of 5.
- Glascote has the largest number of families and also has the largest number of children under the age of 5.

- The Early Years Reach across the Tamworth district ranges from 53.8% in Spital ward to 82.5% in Glascote, giving an overall average for the district of 65.0%.
- The overall reach of 65.0% for Tamworth is just into the range considered outstanding by Ofsted.
- Of the 10 wards in Tamworth, there are no wards below 51%, the rate deemed good by Ofsted, 6 wards are deemed good as they have a reach of between 51-65%, with the remaining 4 wards, of Glascote, Mercian, Amington and Belgrave being deemed outstanding.

- The teenage pregnancy rate in Tamworth is well above the Staffordshire and the national average by over 10 percentage points, however Trinity and Bolehall are both significantly lower.
- Stoneydelph has a rate that is more than twice the Staffordshire average, at 68.4%.
- However, it should be noted that 73% of all the under 18 conceptions in Tamworth result in abortions.

- General Fertility Rates are statistically higher in the Tamworth ward of Belgrave at over 10 per 1,000 more than the national figure of 64.
   Glascote and Stoneydelph also have figures higher than the England rate.
- The lowest proportions of general fertility can be found in Mercian and Spital. All but these two wards have a rate above that of the Staffordshire average.
- Mercian also has one of the lowest number of live births along with Spital ward, in comparison to Wilnecote which has a significantly higher number of births with an annual average of 140.

- In only 3 of the Tamworth wards, Belgrave, Bolehall and Wilnecote, the percentage of mothers smoking at time of delivery is below the national and Staffordshire average, with 4 wards having rates higher than county and national averages.
- The rate of 3 wards are suppressed due to the low numbers.
- Tamworth has a slightly higher percentage of mothers who give birth to babies with a low birthweight, with half of all wards having a rate above Staffordshire and England. Mercian has the largest proportion with 13.4% of babies born under 2,500g.

- The percentage of mothers who take up breastfeeding at birth in Tamworth district is lower than the national average of 74% for all 10 wards, with Glascote significantly lower at 44% in comparison to the national figure of 74%.
- All wards show a drop in the numbers of taking up breastfeeding at birth with mothers still breastfeeding at 6-8 weeks. The biggest drop is in Stoneydelph where there is a reduction of 44 percentage points.
- The ward of Glascote shows the smallest drop in breastfeeding between birth and prevalence at 6-8 weeks with a percentage change of 23%, which is still a significant drop.
- Breastfeeding prevalence in the Tamworth district is below the average for Staffordshire, and significantly below the average for England.

- There are 153 PVI childcare providers in Tamworth of which 72% provided a response to the sufficiency audit.
- There are 80 PVI childcare providers registered for funded childcare places of which 89% provided a response.
- The current childcare sufficiency shows overall in Tamworth there is a 16% vacancy rate approximately for three and four year olds who are entitled to 15 hours of free childcare.
- For children requiring a Think2 childcare place there is currently a 29% vacancy rate in Tamworth.

- The rate of children under 5 years of age who attended A & E is above the England rate for all wards within the Tamworth district, with the highest being Belgrave at 857 per 1,000 children compared to 540 per 1,000 across England.
- Overall, Tamworth has a relatively low proportion of children under the age of 5 who have been admitted into hospital from unintentional injuries, with all but 2 districts below the Staffordshire average of 149.
- Castle and Mercian have figures higher than Staffordshire for children aged 0-4 admitted to hospital at 204 and 155 respectively.
- There are an additional 3 wards where admissions are lower than the Staffordshire average but these figures have been suppressed due to the low numbers.

- Excess weight for reception aged children is just below the national average in Tamworth, with 6 of the 10 wards in Tamworth having a percentage below that of England.
- Stoneydelph and Trinity have the highest percentages of excess weight with 25.7% and 25.0% respectively.
- Amington has the lowest percentage of children with excess weight at 17.4%, at 6 percentage points below the Staffordshire average.
- Mercian has the highest proportion of reception aged children who are obese at over 5 times the Staffordshire and England average of 9%.
- All other wards within Tamworth are around the average for Staffordshire at 9% of reception aged children.
