Foreword

Welcome to the 2024 – 2025 Academic School Year Active Travel Guide.

At the start of every school year, we aim to bring you a useful guide to support your activity planning where walking and cycling training, activities and campaigns can play a part to help you achieve your outcomes. Within this guide there are also the highlights from 2023/24 in our Year in Review.

2024/25 will see our offer to all schools take on a few big changes. We have been fortunate to receive funding to bring in additional staff capacity for the next 2 years to increase active travel through key projects. Walking Buses and School Streets will play a big role for our team as they link the school run to Climate Change and changes to local infrastructure. Four new School Travel Advisors will begin in September to join our existing team members. Along with our new team members we also have a new Bikeability provider to deliver our consistently excellent cycle training which is still free to all schools.

Climate change, the cost of living, decreases in activity levels and increased physical and mental health challenges are just a few of the negative impacts affecting families and school staff currently.

By increasing individuals active travel this contributes to the recommended minutes activity per week. It is often easier than people think too. With your help our aim is to influence the school run making our streets safer, our residents happier and our children healthier.

Please share copies of this guide sent to you with your teaching and wider staffing group to ensure they are aware of the support we can offer. Pop it in the staff room and raise active school travel at a staff meeting or inset day!

2023 – 2024 Active School Travel – Year in Review

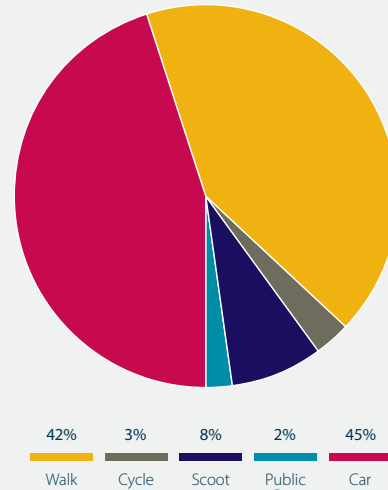
84% of schools responded to the annual census. This data provided has been used for funding bids for a variety of projects. Thanks to all schools that responded with this valuable data.

Car use has remained the same for the second consecutive year whilst walking rates have fallen slightly and this is below the national average

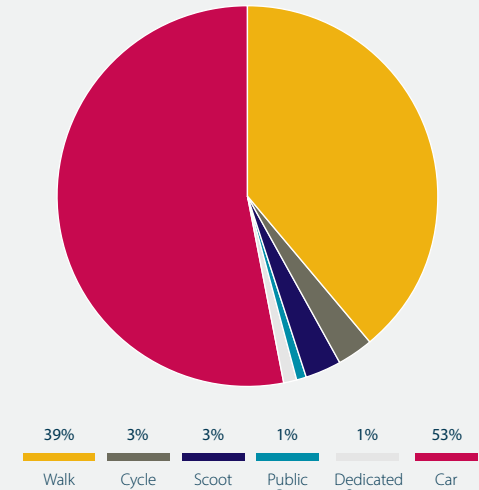

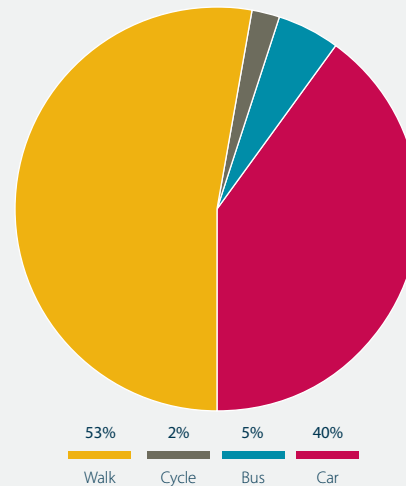
Travel Data 2023-24 for All Infant



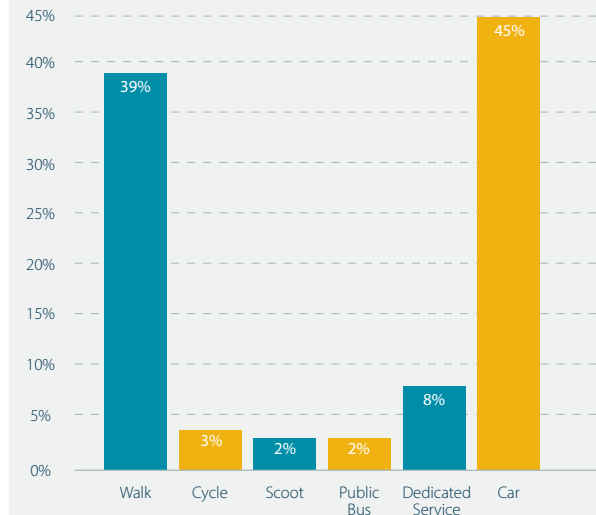
Travel Data 2023-24 for All Primary

Be Bright Be Seen Campaign

We rolled out the new look Be Bright Be Seen campaign to all schools in Staffordshire (in the school e-bag) with brand-new resources. This campaign is designed to complement Road Safety Week in November and encourages parents and pupils to wear bright clothing and accessories on the journey to school over the winter months.

We had many schools promoting this campaign and our team of School Travel Advisors visited schools throughout the county to deliver Be Bright Be Seen Assemblies, give out free bookmarks and activity booklets for this campaign.

Bright
Wear fluorescent or brightly coloured clothing when walking to and from school.

Reflective
When it's dark outside, wear reflective clothing to be seen in car headlights.

Improve
Improve your visibility with accessories - clip on reflectors, bands and stickers to your coat and bag.

Green cross code
Only cross at crossings and well lit areas. Remember to use the Green Cross Code.

Headlights
Remember it's the law to have clean and working headlights on your bike in the dark. **White** at the front, **red** at the back, as well as a rear reflector.

Think
Always think about what you're wearing before you head out in the dark. Are you too dark to be seen? **Think smart, stay safe.**

Walk to School Week 2024

For Walk to School Week in May this year we offered every school in Staffordshire the opportunity to request resources to promote the campaign over 150 schools from around the county signed up and encouraged walking and/or park and stride for the whole week. They received railing banners, posters and bookmarks as rewards for pupils taking part.

Some schools went the extra mile and put on events and challenges to encourage more families to join in like Roaming with a Roman. Look out for the same campaign for May 2025.



Anti-Idling Campaigns

This ever-popular pupil-led campaign has again been seen by many drivers around Staffordshire this year, thanks to all of the pupils who have been involved. Pupils at Richard Wakefield Primary school ran the campaign to educate their parents about air pollution by handing out leaflets and car stickers and asking their parents to sign a pledge. They measured the air quality around the school during the campaign and monitored how many cars they saw idling each day for the weeklong campaign.

By the end of the week, they were struggling to find any cars with their engines running and the pollution levels had fallen dramatically. They were armed with a megaphone and banners too, to make sure no-one passing by would fail to notice them in action. Year in Review - continued

Outwoods Primary School – A Case Study

Outwoods Primary school got in touch with us in 2021 with problems around parking on the road immediately outside the school. We had received complaints from residents and parents regarding the way parents were parking and concerns around the safety of pupils walking to school. The school was also in an area that has elevated levels of air pollution due to local traffic and school traffic near to the school. The school were rightly concerned about all of these issues and wanted to see them improve.

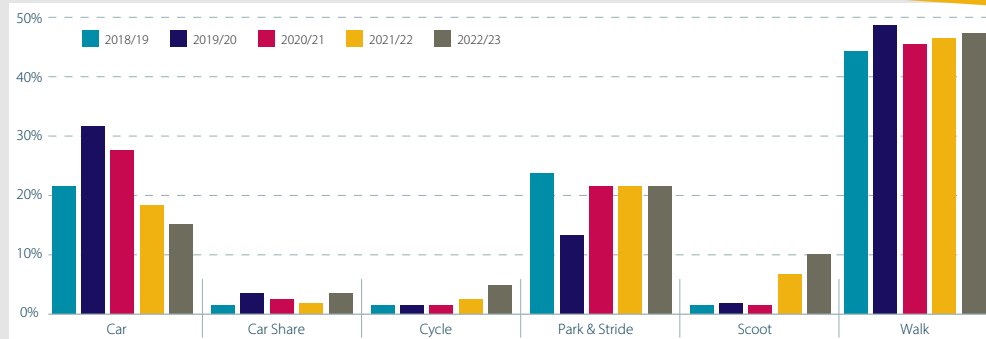
We supported the school with a travel plan which was developed with school staff to highlight the issues and identify potential solutions to alleviate them. One of the issues identified was the lack of cycle and scooter storage at the school.



We signposted the school towards the Climate Action Fund which they applied for in a really simple process and received £1,500 towards their new cycle and scooter storage. The storage was installed in 2023, and school staff delivered a half-term of scooter activities in their PE lessons to encourage their use. Every pupil in school received a Scoot Magazine encouraging safe and sensible scooter use.

The school also take part in Bikeability Training and have an active group of Active Travel Ambassadors who encourage active travel and have run anti-idling and parking campaigns outside their school to engage with parents. This has resulted in a dramatic reduction in cars around the school as parents have embraced the school's and pupil's messaging and enthusiasm.

The result of this is that car use has reduced by half in the last 4 years whilst cycling and scooting rates have risen dramatically, and other parents choose to Park & Stride. All of this has also had a positive effect on air quality around the school and pupils are getting more exercise, meaning they are healthier as a result.



Mrs Cutbush, Headteacher at Outwoods Primary said, "Our commitment to sustainability and climate change is very important to us in school. We review our climate commitment regularly so that we assess the impact of our work with stakeholders in our community. The Travel Ambassadors embrace the work that they do and drive initiatives in school with the support and encouragement from Staff. They are very knowledgeable about the impact that actions of people have on our world and articulate this information to parents and relatives superbly. We are extremely proud of Climate Commitment and are committed to making a difference".

September

Act Travel Wise Week

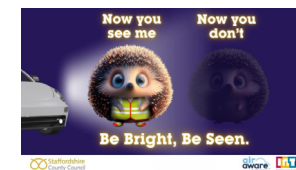


November

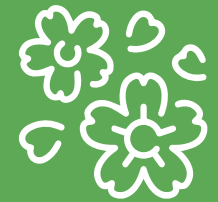

February 14th

Love Your Journey

Lack of exercise and overexposure to air pollution are two of the main contributing factors leading to heart disease. Staff, pupils and parents can all get involved by using their heart on their journey to school for St Valentine's Day. Air pollution is a problem around most urban schools in Staffordshire, but all schools will see pollution levels worsen at pick up and drop off times. You can do your bit to help improve the air quality around your school and increase activity levels, both of which can lessen the risk of heart disease.



March

Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel

The Big Walk and Wheel is a national challenge aiming to increase physical activity on the journey to school and reduce school gate parking issues, which takes place during March. April

Air Aware Anti-Idling

The Anti-Idling campaign is back for 2025 to reduce idling engines around our county. For schools we have signage, posters, banners, digital support, and classroom activities.



There is so much to access, and the benefits are massive.

Don't fume at the fumers, let them know to "turn off", remember 1 minute of idling can fill approximately 150 balloons with pollution. The pupil led Anti-Idling campaign is informative, raising awareness of the harm of idling, delivered in a positive way. The School Run Revolution

It highlights the problems many schools have with inconsiderate and dangerous parking in the vicinity of the school gates. New families can develop active and sustainable travel habits right from the start which will continue throughout their time at your school. Help them understand how important this is from the very start.

General activities for any time of the year

Walking Buses

Between the launch of the Walking Bus in 2000 to 2020 over 100 schools in Staffordshire had one or more walking bus routes. At one stage 144 volunteer led walking buses were running, was your school one of these?

We are now fortunate to have 5 School Travel Advisors in the team who can support schools to set up a Walking Bus. We can provide equipment, training and guidance to get schools up and running again.

What is the Walking Bus?

There is a lead walker, a rear walker and a ratio of adults to children to ensure the group are moved from the suitable start point to the school with potential "stops" on the way. The route is chosen and assessed by the Active Travel Team, training and equipment is provided to the leaders.

Why set up a route?

The benefits include decreased congestion around the school, increased pupil attendance, a visible sign to the community that the school takes transport issues seriously. Raised activity levels and increased alertness when arriving to school for the children walking and social inclusion, local area awareness and extra time for parents.

How to get involved?

Park & Stride

For those families not able to walk all of the way to school, suitable Park & Stride locations can be identified and suggested to parents, to ease congestion in the close vicinity of the school. (Staff who live local to your school should be able to assist in this matter – they know the local area well).

Typically, a good Park & Stride location is 5-10 minutes walk away from the school and has ample parking – a public house, supermarket, village hall are ideal. School Streets

Congestion around schools can be horrendous during pick up and drop off times, and an hour later the area can look totally different. Air pollution, congestion, unsafe and inconsiderate parking is an issue for many schools. Not every school can reduce the traffic flow by having a temporary road closure, but for some locations this is an ideal option.

Across the country many local authorities are involved in this scheme which is supported by Active Travel England.

We are looking for 10 schools to work with us to bring School Streets to Staffordshire.

What is involved?

Our team will work with you to assess the suitability looking at the location of your school, proximity to other services and alternative routes. Working with Highways, Sustrans and other stakeholders to bring about all changes required to restrict traffic at key times. We will also support you with resources to promote alternatives during the process.

Do you want to be involved?

Bikeability

What is Bikeability training?

The following are funded by Active Travel England through Staffordshire County Council to encourage more children to cycle more regularly, improving skills, health and wellbeing. From the first pedal to independent journey planning and riding the following modules are available.

Balance Bike: Reception to Year 2
Preparation for learning and Level 1.
Develop skills and awareness.



Learn to Ride: All ages - To go from balance to pedal, this is suitable for any age, although generally after Balance Bike training.



Bikeability Level 1: Year 3 & 4
Control, pedal and be aware of surroundings. Delivered away from roads in a fun way to increase basic skills. Preparing pupils for Level 2.



Bikeability Level 2: Years 5 (not in Autumn Term) & 6 - On road training to increase confidence, understand the road and signals, how to negotiate junctions and share the road with other road users.

What is an Active Travel Ambassador?

Our Active Travel Ambassador scheme is open for all schools to take part in. The pupil group can be run as an after-school club, lunchtime club, or as part of your Eco Club or School Council.

These enthusiastic pupils help lead and support campaigns in school to encourage walking and wheeling and to lead on campaigns to educate and inform parents. Each group will receive a welcome pack, Ambassador Badge and choice

Parking Toolkit

Our Pupil Parking Toolkit has been out and about in Staffordshire this year targeting drivers who illegally park on double yellow lines or the Zig-Zag markings near the school or park irresponsibly. This Pupil led campaign has proven to be really effective when run over consecutive days and has made parents aware of their obligations if travelling to school by car.

Mr Newcombe at Anglesey Primary in Burton said, *"We have had some serious issues taking place outside our school involving near misses and dangerous parking. Our Active Travel Ambassadors ran this campaign to educate parents and send out a strong message to anyone not obeying the law. They were so enthusiastic and made a real difference"*.

Staffordshire County Council has a team of School Travel Advisors dedicated to working with schools around the county to help implement all the schemes, resources and campaigns within this booklet. The exciting news is that we have a bigger team than ever for 2024/25 with six staff able to support schools with Walking Buses, Travel Plans, Campaigns, Assemblies and Resources. This enthusiastic team will work with your school to help improve activity rates, cut congestion around the school and help the school be more sustainable and help you meet the Sustainable Schools Net Zero by 2030 commitments.

Most of our team have worked in schools for years, and we are very much aware of how busy schools are and want to help you deliver these initiatives without too much effort on your part and make life easier for your team. The benefits of working with us are many and fit in with PHSE activities, STEM activities and Citizenship.

Modeshift STARS Travel Plan

A School Travel Plan (STP) is a document which sets out how a school will promote safer, active and sustainable travel, with the main emphasis on reducing the number of journeys made by private vehicles.

An effective School Travel Plan should contain an action plan of initiatives to reduce the number of vehicles on the journey to school, encourage more active and sustainable travel choices, and improve safety on the journey to school.

School Travel Planning is supported by the Department for Transport through the Modeshift STARS accredited scheme. Schools benefit from a range of additional funded activities to help them achieve award levels from Green to Platinum which non-participating schools would be unable to access.

We currently work with around 60 schools in Staffordshire with a Modeshift STARS School Travel Plan.



Modeshift School of The Region

Staffordshire County Council have supported schools to win *Modeshift Stars School of The Region* FOUR times in the last 5 years.

The latest school to win the award was St Edwards Middle School in Leek. Their Travel plan was rated Outstanding by the panel of judges and were awarded the best school award for the Midlands Region. There are only 5 regions in the country so winning this award means they are only one of 5 schools in England to do so.

As a result they were invited to London to take part in the School of the Year Final for 2023. Sadly, they didn't win the big award but just to be in that position was a huge achievement.

Mr Simm of St Edwards is pictured with the team of Active Travel Ambassadors at the school and he said, *"The work the Active Travel Ambassadors do is really important to us as a school to help tackle climate change and to improve the safety of our pupils coming to school. It also improves the health and wellbeing of pupils and supports them to lead health happy lives"*.



Living Streets WOW campaign

Living Streets are offering all schools in Staffordshire the opportunity to take part in their Schools Outreach Programme for their WOW campaign. Schools would normally have to pay for this resource which includes a free travel tracker that records how children travel to school, and free badges at the end of each month to reward those that make the effort to Walk, Wheel or Park & Stride to school.

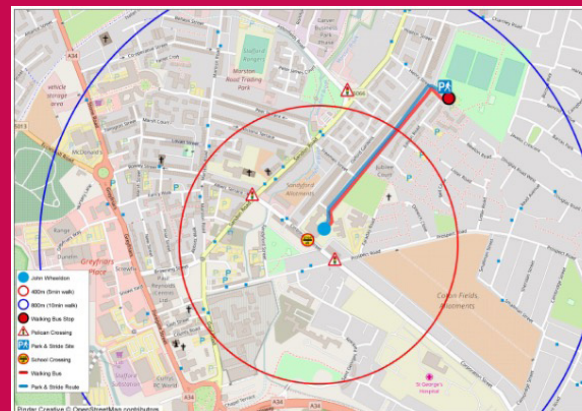
Sustrans
